Mayor Dorman Sworn in as President of Suffolk County Village Officials Association



Allan Dorman was sworn Suffolk County Village Officials Association (SCVOA) during the organization's annual golf tournament and meeting, which was held on June 15 at the

Maidstone Golf Club in East Hampton. He previously served as SCVOA's first vice president.

First elected to office in 2005, Mayor Dorman has implemented many improvements to the village, including a comprehensive road improvement program and the Islandia Senior Bus, a service that shuttles senior citizens curb-to-curb for doctor's visits and shopping

As a Vietnam veteran, Mayor Dorman was committed to having a memorial built to honor the many veterans in the Islandia community. The Islandia Veterans Memorial was dedicated in 2009 and, since then, it has become the site of the village's annual Veterans Day and Memorial

M. Day ceremonies. He worked with other local elected officials to acquire land that was used to build affordable in as president of the housing for returning war veterans. He also oversaw the establishment of a Veterans of Foreign Wars post at Islandia Commons and reserved parking for veterans at the Village Hall parking lot.

> He is very visible in the community as he hosts "Cup of Joe with the Mayor" every Saturday morning at Village Hall, where he meets with residents and listens to their concerns and suggestions. He also invites families to meet with him at the village's annual Bar-B-Que, Pumpkin Fest, Christmas tree lighting ceremony, and Easter Egg Hunt.

A Message from the Mayor

Real Tax Relief — Finally!

Village Taxes to be Reduced by Up to 50%

Dear Neighbor:

As I explained at our many "Cup of Joe" meetings, I would continue to communicate with Village residents regarding Delaware North, Delaware Properties, LLC's (Delaware North) application to operate Video Lottery Terminals, two Suffolk OTB kiosk machines and OTB simulcasts at the Marriott Hotel, located off the Long Island Expressway's North Service Road within the Village of Islandia.

I am pleased to announce that, following extensive negotiations and public meetings to review the application, the Board of Trustees has approved the application. As part of the agreement, the Village retains the authority to review the special use permit every two years. In addition, as detailed below, the agreement will provide Village residents with real, significant property tax relief.

There has been a lot of misinformation put forward by **non-resident civic organizations** that I also want to address:

The Facts

- Hotel's Appearance The plan for the exterior appearance of the hotel will not change, other than the name. There are no plans to add lighting on the building that would make it more visible to passing traffic. New fencing and landscaping enhancements will be added to the appearance of the property.
- **Security** Security will be provided around the clock with surveillance and guard presence within and outside the hotel. Parking lot security will be addressed with roving security patrols, surveillance and valet parking attendants managing the lot throughout the hours of operation. Village of Islandia security will be visible on and around the surrounding area 24/7.
- Fire Protection The Marriott Hotel has been at the same location for over 35 years and is serviced by the Central Islip and Hauppauge Fire Departments. It is also serviced by the Central Islip Hauppauge Volunteer Ambulance Corps (CHVAC).
- **Traffic** This hotel is located on Expressway Drive North with access to the Long Island Expressway from both directions. New traffic controls will be implemented to minimize traffic on local roads.
- No Buses The applicant has agreed that it will not provide an incentive to bus companies to bring patrons to the location.
- No Special Events Delaware North has agreed that there will be no Vegas-style shows at the hotel. Tony Orlando is not coming to Islandia.

In addition to addressing the concerns raised above, the approval provides several significant benefits to the Village and surrounding communities, including real, significant tax relief to Village residents, along with job creation.

Tax Relief & Job Creation Benefits

• **Job Opportunities** — Delaware North anticipates that

- over 200 jobs will be created by way of this approval. It has agreed to give preference to local residents and provide job training to all employees.
- No IDA Tax Abatement Delaware North is not seeking any IDA benefits. All taxes will be paid to the Village and Hauppauge Schools.
- Initial Funding Delaware North has agreed to pay the Village \$1,532,400 for completing the construction and development of the Village's First Responders Recreation Baseball Field located on Old Nichols Road.
- **\$47 Million in Tax Relief Payments** The operator has agreed to make equal annual payments amounting to \$47 million over the course of the 20-year term.

As a result of this approval, Islandia residents will finally experience real tax relief. Some residents pay as high as \$1,200 per year in Village taxes alone. Some mom-and-pop businesses pay Village taxes as high as — and even higher than — \$18,000 to \$24,000 per year. Village taxes will be reduced by up to 50% within the first two years of the agreement and will be progressively lower each year after that.

School district taxes account for, by far, the largest portion of a local resident's tax bill. Within the Village, three school districts operate: Central Islip, Connetquot and Hauppauge. The taxes for these school districts account for 72.9%, 73.1% and 60% of an average resident's tax bill, respectively. Residents who live in the Central Islip and Connetquot school districts pay about \$1,300 more each year in school taxes, since the commercial and industrial base isn't as large as that of Hauppauge. While we can't control school district taxes directly, as a Village, we can help to grow the commercial and industrial tax base and bring in more revenue to provide **real** tax relief to the remaining hamlets of Central Islip and Ronkonkoma. Hauppauge residents will also receive a reduction in Village taxes, along with the reduction in school taxes they already receive. Hauppauge taxpayers win either way, and that's OK.

As your Mayor, I have worked tirelessly at reducing the tax burden on Village residents. In 2010, we eliminated Village garbage taxes, saving homeowners about \$500 per year. I am now proud to say that this agreement will have a **real** impact on local families and their ability to withstand the high cost of living on Long Island.

In the summer of 2010, the village purchased a new bus to help senior citizens get to where they need to go. Bus service began on October 18, 2010, but only on a limited schedule. Since then, the village has expanded its service.
